To whom it may concern,

I am writing in support of GoFarm and their efforts to find land to serve as a centralized location for the Farmer Incubator program. As a beginning farmer, I have felt, first hand, the barriers to entry that exist for people who wish to pursue small-scale agriculture as a career. Regardless of passion and determination, a lack of access to capital, infrastructure, or mentorship make this career path seem all but impossible, especially in a metro area with a high cost of living like Denver. As an apprentice in GoFarm's Farmer Incubator, I can say that the support I receive in this program has allowed me to successfully design and execute the first season of my farm business. I'm certain that finding a centralized location for this incubator program would allow me, and future participants, to get the most out of the program in order to establish long-term, sustainable careers as producers of local, organically-grown food.

Currently, I farm on two plots in Lakewood. Though these plots are fairly close in proximity (about 10 minutes by car), splitting time, energy, and physical resources (such as tools) between two locations does take away from my ability to focus on what is most important. I believe having a central location with larger plots, shared tools, and shared infrastructure would increase my productivity exponentially, and would allow apprentices to deepen their hands-on learning experience as a whole.

Although I love the feeling of independence that this line of work allows, I know that farming is a communal activity. Farmers learn from each other, innovate together, and share resources in order to build up our chosen work. Having a physical space that fosters such cooperation would benefit each individual farmer apprentice, but would also serve as a model for how urban farmers should approach working collaboratively to move toward our shared goal of a robust, thriving local food system.

I can't say enough about the positive nature of GoFarm as an organization, and also with regard to their individual staff members. I feel strongly supported by Katie, the farmer incubator manager, and have only experienced open and clear communication with other GoFarm staff members. I am confident that anyone who contributes to GoFarm's operation will find the same. GoFarm's culture of kindness, support, and forward momentum makes them an excellent organization with which to align.

I am happy to provide additional explanation of the value that GoFarm already brings to beginning farmers and the many ways we all would benefit from access to a large, centralized physical space for our program.
